Eddie has spinal muscular atrophy and his prognosis at birth was that he wouldn't survive beyond five years old - he is now 27.

He recently became the first African with a disability to graduate from Oxford University. He is now setting up an organisation that promotes safer and more accessible spaces in South Africa for people with disabilities.

He has now declared that his next goal is to be the first disabled person to go into space.
